What truly elevates the utility of this platform is its capacity to power critical care devices, including cardiac monitors, ventilators, and communications systems — transforming it from a transport device into a mobile care platform.

In a region like Lanark County, where geography and climate frequently add complexity to our responses, a tool like this can have a meaningful, even life-saving impact. It aligns with our mission to continually advance the capabilities of our service, and I am confident that it will serve as a valuable asset not only for our team but for paramedic services across the province and beyond.
